Agencies are buying. But in too many cases, the transformation never arrives — because the technology was never truly integrated with the people, workflows, and culture it was supposed to serve. From 911 operators managing traumatic calls for service to firefighters facing repeated exposure to threatening environments, burnout, post-traumatic stress, and chronic health conditions are persistent challenges across public safety disciplines. Additionally - as call volumes grow and data streams multiply, first responder agencies have more information than ever—but not always the tools, training, or integration needed to turn that data into meaningful action. In this session we’ll walk through the strategies used in Ada County, Idaho, where fire-rescue and EMS leaders are using Peregrine to turn fragmented operational data into a unified picture of first responder health and wellness. Peregrine brings together real-time and historical data across incidents, shifts, and careers—tracking firefighters’ exposure to harmful chemicals, paramedics’ repeated exposure to traumatic events, and related safety and wellness indicators. By translating complex data into clear, actionable insights, public safety leaders can identify cumulative risk earlier, spot emerging wellness trends, evenly balance workloads, identify early indicators of strain, and make evidence-based decisions that strengthen prevention strategies. 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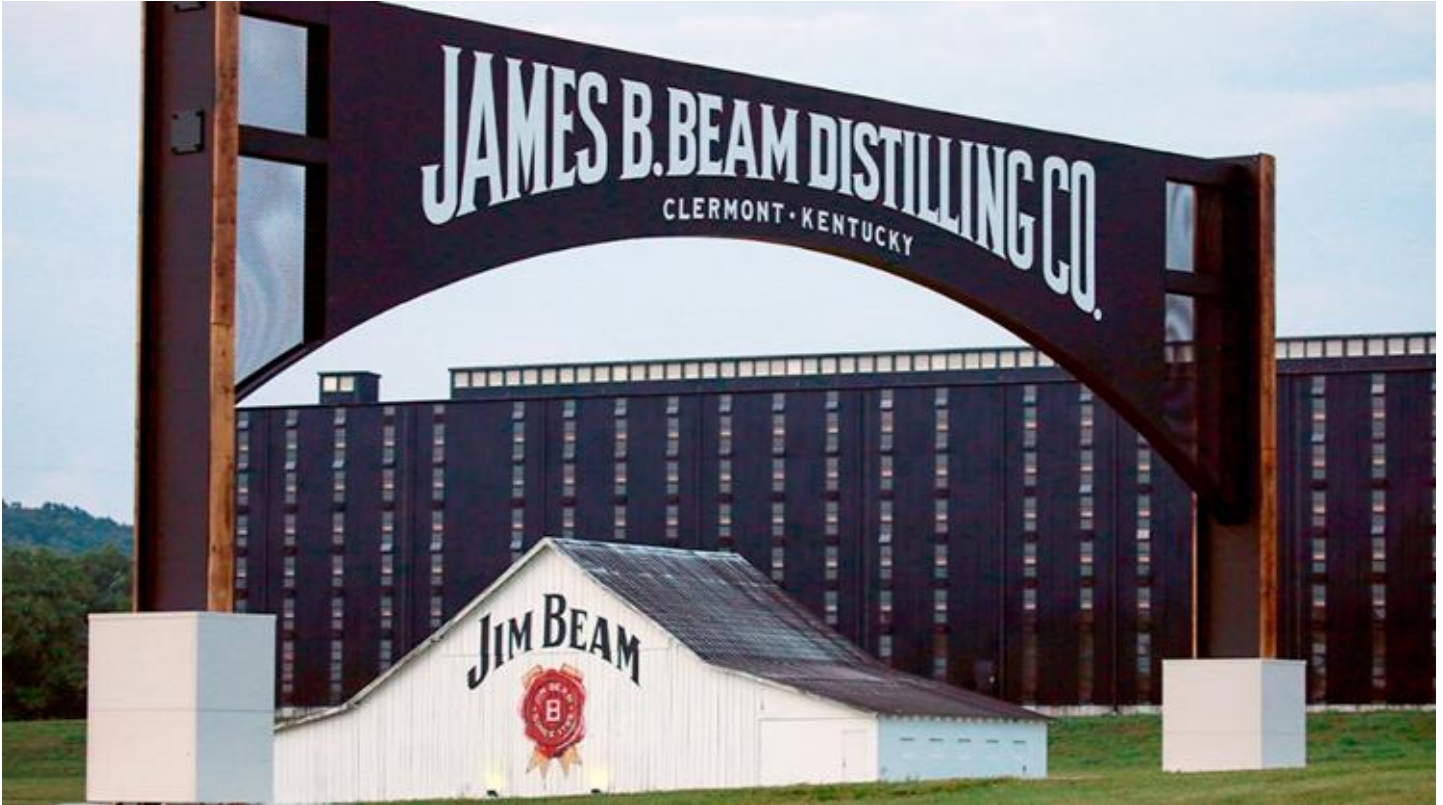

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TRAINING – TACTICAL RESPONSE TO SUICIDE BOMBING INCIDENTS, MOBILE (AWR-426) NEW MEXICO TECH

Tactical Response to Suicide Bombing Incidents (TRSBI), Mobile is a course that provides law enforcement tactical officers with knowledge to prevent and respond to suicide bombing incidents. Through lectures, discussions, case studies, and exercises, law enforcement tactical officers are presented with information on preventing, deterring, and mitigating the effects of a suicide bomber. In addition, course participants learn how to implement response strategies for active suicide bombers and post-blast incidents. The course culminates with a tabletop exercise where course participants can apply the knowledge they have gained throughout the course by practicing life-saving tactics, techniques, and procedures during a notional suicide bombing scenario.

Terminal Learning Objectives (TLOs)

- Recognize the suicide bombing threat and the variety of emerging tactics terrorists use to accomplish their objective.
- Recognize explosive characteristics, blast effects, and common military, commercial, and homemade explosives.

- Apply appearance and behavioral indicators to determine reasonable suspicion and probable cause in a suicide bombing attack.
- Evaluate strategies to respond to person-borne or vehicle-borne improvised explosive device attacks.
- Identify response strategies needed to safely and effectively respond to post-blast events.
- Discuss the initial considerations of tactical officers during a suicide bombing incident and the implementation of non-linear tactics to defeat a suicide bomber.
- Demonstrate non-linear tactics during a tactical response to an active shooter/aggression suicide bomber tabletop exercise.

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WORKSHOP – SENIOR OFFICIALS WORKSHOP FOR ALL-HAZARDS PREPAREDNESS (MGT-312)

This workshop provides a forum for senior officials to understand strategic and executive-level issues related to all-hazards disaster preparedness, to share proven strategies and best practices, and to enhance coordination among whole community officials responsible for emergency preparedness, response, and recovery. The workshop emphasizes planning, operational coordination and public information and warning through extensive group discussions and a table-top exercise. The final outcome of the seminar is the development of an action plan to improve the preparedness posture of the community/organization.

- This workshop is typically delivered at a time and place determined by the requested jurisdiction. Each workshop, including site and curriculum delivery costs, is fully funded through DHS/FEMA's Homeland Security National Training Program.

Course Length:

- 8 hours

Workshop Topics:

- Roles and responsibilities and preparedness challenges
- Domestic preparedness resources and how to leverage them for your community.
- Homeland Security Strategic Planning as it relates to risk and needs assessment and the Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) for your jurisdiction.
- Executive-level incident response and recovery considerations, including medical/public health, situational appraisal, incident management (ICS), mutual aid agreements, media relations, recovery and restoration processes, Federal assistance, and business/economic recovery.
- Includes a practical exercise tailored for the jurisdiction(s) as the catalyst to generate discussion of policy and emergency operations center activities required to support the incident commander's and state/federal government requirements related to an all-hazard, catastrophic incident.

BENCHMARKING: PREPAREDNESS GRANTS MEET UP FOR STATE ADMINISTRATIVE AGENCIES (SAA) REPRESENTATIVES

The presentation will actually be a discussion among representatives of the FEMA Preparedness Grants State Administrative Agencies (SAA's). FEMA hosts a town hall each year at the NHSC to discuss topics and provide information from the federal government perspective related to the FEMA Preparedness Grant Programs. The meeting request that is submitted today would be for representatives from SAA's to have a discussion among their fellow SAA colleagues in order to meet, discuss best practices, and form a working group that will facilitate further colleague discussion, and assist new colleagues. The basic format is to identify an experienced colleague for each of the FEMA Preparedness Grant Programs as a subject matter expert, which could facilitate discussion, or answer questions for their program of expertise. The request for this session should take place hopefully prior to the FEMA Town Hall so that SAA's can assist other colleagues with items related to state administration that don't involve matters related to FEMA. Hopefully this session will allow the FEMA town hall to be more focused on those strictly federal government to SAA related matters.



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SEMINAR – STRATEGIC OVERVIEW OF DISASTER MANAGEMENT FOR WATER AND WASTEWATER UTILITIES (MGT-342) TEEX
