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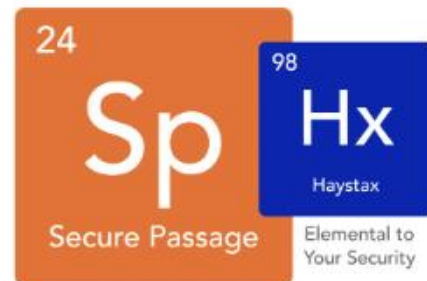

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The 2025 National Homeland Security Conference will be offering an opportunity to catch the “Best of Show”. Presentations will be ranked as “Best of Show” by you and your peers, using the NHSC app during the conference. You will have the opportunity to rate the presentations you attend. “Sorry I Missed That!” will give you the opportunity to select the presentations that you missed but wished you hadn’t. The top five, “Best of Show” and top five “Sorry I Missed That!” regardless of track, will be invited to return for an encore presentation on Thursday, August 28th, from 11:15 to 12:15. 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### Tour #1: US Capitol

**Maximum Attendees:** 25 per tour (2 offerings)

**Check-In Location:** U.S. Capitol Visitors Center, corner of First Street and East Capitol Street

#### DESCRIPTION

The United States Capitol in Washington, D.C., is a symbol of the American people and our government and the meeting place of the nation's legislature, the U.S. Congress. The Capitol is a working office building, but it is also the place where visitors from around the United States and the world come to learn about American democracy.

Construction of the Capitol began in 1793. In November 1800, Congress, along with the Library of Congress and the Supreme Court, moved into the newly completed north wing. The south wing was completed by 1807, but in 1814, the British burned the Capitol during the War of 1812. What is now the center portion of the Capitol was completed in 1826. As the country expanded, more states came into the union and more representatives and senators arrived at the Capitol to represent these new states and their constituents.

Beginning in the 1850s, the Capitol had to grow to make room for these new representatives and senators. The first major construction project extended both wings and enlarged the Capitol Dome. Later, both the West Front and the East Front of the Capitol were expanded, and in 2008, the U.S. Capitol Visitor Center was completed.

#### SCHEDULE

Tours are offered at 10 AM and 2 PM

#### SPECIAL NOTES

Before entering the U.S. Capitol Visitor Center, all visitors are screened by a magnetometer, and all items that are permitted inside the building are screened by an x-ray device. Visitors should keep their belongings with them at all times as unattended items may result in a disruption of service at the Capitol.

While certain exceptions for medical needs can be made, the following items are strictly prohibited:

- Liquid, including water
- Food or beverage of any kind, including fruit and unopened packaged food
- Non-aerosol sprays (Prescriptions for medical needs are permitted.)
- Any bag larger than 18" wide x 14" high x 8.5" deep
- Knives of any size
- Aerosol containers



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- Any pointed object, e.g., knitting needles and letter openers. (Pens and pencils are permitted.)
- Electric stun guns, martial arts weapons or devices
- Guns, replica guns, ammunition and fireworks
- Mace and pepper spray
- Razors and box cutters



### Tour #2: USACE: Walking Tour of The Potomac Park Levee System

**Maximum Attendees:** 25

**Check-In Location:** The Lockkeeper's House, Constitution Ave NW & 17th Street NW

#### DESCRIPTION

Come join us for a look inside the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Flood Risk Management Program! Beginning with a short walking tour of our Potomac Park levee system, we will discuss the levee characteristics and what it protects and then discuss how USACE works together with the Park Service with the Operation and Maintenance of the system. This levee system is a Congressionally authorized Flood Risk Management project that the Corps was tasked with design, construction, and general oversight of the system in order to reduce the risk of flooding to the Federal Triangle and Smithsonian Museums located along the northern side of the DC Mall. Following the physical tour, participants will be welcome to engage in further discussion about how USACE manages their overall systems throughout the Nation and provides support to our local, State, and tribal partners during high water events.

#### SCHEDULE

The tour and discussion will be approximately 1 hour

#### SPECIAL NOTES

Participants should be physically capable of walking on sloped, uneven terrain and dress for the weather.





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### **Tour #5: Washington DC Emergency Operations Center**

**Maximum Attendees: 25 per tour (3 offerings)**

**Check-In Location:** 1015 Half Street SE (one block from the Navy Yard Metro – Half Street exit)

#### **DESCRIPTION**

The Emergency Operations Center (EOC) for the District of Columbia is managed by the Homeland Security and Emergency Management Agency (HSEMA). The mission of HSEMA is to ensure DC agencies, businesses, and residents are prepared to prevent, protect against, respond to, mitigate, and recover from all threats and hazards. The current EOC was completed in 2023 and has been used for several dozen activations including multiple National Special Security Events such as the 2024 NATO Summit, Presidential Inauguration, and multiple weather events and other incidents. The tour will include presentations conducted by EOC management, the District of Columbia Fusion Center, and other public safety partners.

#### **SCHEDULE**

Tours are offered at 9 AM, 1 PM, and 3 PM. Each tour and discussion will last approximately 2 hours.

#### **SPECIAL NOTES**

Please arrive at least 10 minutes early to check in to the facility. This tour is fully ADA accessible. Any international visitors need to be registered at least 60 days in advance.



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### Tour #6: MPD boat tours

**Maximum Attendees: 12 at each of the 2 tours**

**Check-In Location:** 550 Water Street SW – Harbor Patrol Unit Building

#### DESCRIPTION

The mission of the Metropolitan Police Department's Harbor Patrol Unit is to patrol all the rivers, inlets, and waterways of the District of Columbia while ensuring members of the public are practicing safe recreational boating. The Harbor Patrol Unit has a fleet of approximately 20 vessels, which range from jet skis to airboats. All Harbor Patrol officers and sergeants are Public Safety Divers and are always prepared to dive in the District's waterways to search, rescue, and recover at depths ranging from 6 feet up to 40 feet. This tour will give participants a chance to get a behind-the-scenes look at the Harbor facility, learn about the different operational activities performed on a regular basis, and wrap up with a tour of the Channel and Anacostia River.

#### SCHEDULE

Tours will last approximately 1 hour, and will leave at 10 AM & 1 PM

#### SPECIAL NOTES

This tour is limited to American citizens only. Participants are asked to wear closed toe shoes, boat appropriate attire, and bring government-issued identification.



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#### **Tour #7: Union Station/Amtrak**

**Maximum Attendees: 100**

**Check-In Location:** Washington Union Station, 50 Massachusetts Avenue NE

#### **DESCRIPTION**

Washington Union Station is one of the country's first great union railroad terminals, located just five blocks away from the United States Capitol. Designed by renowned architect, Daniel Burnham, the station was completed in April 1908. In 1981, Congress passed the Union Station Redevelopment Act, creating the rehabilitation and redevelopment of the Union Station complex as a multi-use transportation terminal serving the Nation's Capital, and secondarily as a commercial complex.

With over 100,000 people using the station daily, it is the second busiest station in the Amtrak system. Union Station provides service to the Northeast Corridor via Acela Express and Northeast Regional Service and eight Amtrak long-distance and regional trains. Union Station is a busy transit hub serving 14 types of transportation, from passenger trains including Amtrak, Virginia Railway Express (VRE), Maryland Area Rail Commuter (MARC), to inter-city buses, bike sharing, cabs, ridesharing services, and a Metro station.

The Station Revitalization Plan envisions dramatically improving facilities that will be modern, safe, and secure, which will accommodate three times as many passengers and twice as many trains. This will all be within the same footprint and will preserve the Union Station's historic architectural design. The station's 214,000-square-foot shopping mall will be renovated, and a large mixed-use development is being planned for the station's rail yard.

The Amtrak Police Department (APD), the national police force of the carrier, operates out of Union Station with uniformed police officers and K9 units specializing in bomb and narcotic detection. Nationwide, the APD has more than 450 officers and employees. The APD provides security and safety to the traveling public, employees, stations, and rail equipment, with statute for interstate police powers. The department is an accredited national railroad full-service police force established by the Rail Passenger Service Act of 1970.

Tour participants will have the opportunity to tour the station, visit an Amtrak trainset, experience a K9 demonstration showcasing bomb detection with bomb scents and test an Amtrak train simulator.

#### **SCHEDULE**

Arrival at Union Station at 1 PM, and departure at 3 PM. Tour participants will break up into smaller groups to cycle through each station experience.

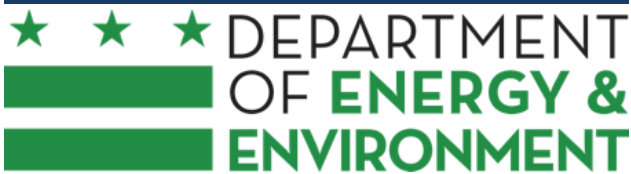

This tour in the Emergency Department will be to see the special chemical warfare protocol and decontamination area, followed by a presentation/panel. The presentation will be about hospital-based emergency management within DC at The George Washington University Hospital with a focus on recontamination.

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**Tour #11: District Department of Transportation Riverfront Bicycle Tour**

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**Tour #14: Smithsonian Institution Office of Emergency Management**

**DESCRIPTION**

The Smithsonian Institution is the world's largest museum, education, and research complex, with 21 museums, 14 education and research centers, and the National Zoo—shaping the future by preserving heritage, discovering new knowledge, and sharing our resources with the world.

The Office of Emergency Management (OEM) collaborates across the Institution to improve the Smithsonian's ability to respond to emergencies and recover from disasters. OEM works closely with Smithsonian staff to perform emergency planning and manage emergency operations, conduct training and exercises, perform risk reduction activities, and improve the Smithsonian's overall capacity to respond to and recover from natural, technological, and human-made hazards. Their work also involves working side-by-side with local, state and federal partners to address emergency issues at their facilities and properties and promote the greater public safety interests in the communities they call "home."

This tour will include both public and behind-the-scenes areas of one or more Smithsonian museums on the National Mall to showcase how Smithsonian OEM keeps visitors safe and coordinates with other partners on the multiple adjacent events that regularly occur outside the museums.

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### **Tour #16: Downtown DC Business Improvement District**

**Maximum Attendees: 25**

**Check-In Location:** Washington Convention Center

#### **DESCRIPTION**

The Downtown DC Business Improvement District (BID) is a catalyst, facilitator, and thought leader in diversifying the economy, promoting public-private partnerships, and enhancing the downtown experience for all. They oversee a 140-block area of approximately 530 properties and numerous parks and public spaces.

This tour will start outside the Washington Convention Center, where the BID and DC's Metropolitan Police (MPD) will discuss how the business community and public safety agencies collaborate on the numerous special events that impact the area. These have included National Special Security Events (NSSEs) such as the 60<sup>th</sup> Presidential Inauguration, the 2024 NATO Summit, and the United States-Africa Leaders' Summit in 2022.

Next, the tour will include walking a few blocks South to F Street where the Downtown DC BID, the Holiday Market, and other public events between 7<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> Streets. The focus of this tour will emphasis how to safely operate a street closure for public events. Attendees will learn how the Downtown DC BID and public agencies maintain a safe environment during daily operations and special events requiring street closure for public events. Officials from the BID and Metropolitan Police Department (MPD) will share their experiences on safely operating street closures for public events.

At 9 AM meet at the front of the Convention Center for a brief discussion before walking to F Street NW and returning at 11 AM.

### **Summary:**

What emergency manager hasn't worked through a long or challenging after-action review process following a real-world incident? Drawing on years of experience with after-action reviews and continuous improvement, a panel of state and local emergency managers will discuss their approaches to completing after-action reviews. FEMA's Continuous Improvement Technical Assistance Program will moderate, and lead discussions focused on the development and success of their jurisdictions' After-Action Reports (AARs) from recent major incidents. The panelists will consider what went well and describe what they would do differently to drive more change and action through their after-action review process. The discussion will consider topics from all four continuous improvement phases described in FEMA's National Continuous Improvement Guidance (Discovery, Validation, Resolution, and Evaluation). This will include discussion of data collection and analysis, action tracking, and assessing the success of completed actions. During the discussion of each phase, attendees will be engaged through a question-and-answer session with the panelists and moderator.

### **Learning Objectives:**

- Participants will learn more about the continuous improvement process as described in FEMA's National Continuous Improvement Guidance.
- Participants will engage in peer-to-peer learning on approaches that worked well for their continuous improvement activities using recent incident after-action reviews.

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## WORKSHOP - SENIOR OFFICIALS WORKSHOP FOR ALL-HAZARDS PREPAREDNESS (MGT-312)

The final outcome of the seminar is the development of an action plan to improve the preparedness posture of the community/organization.

### TRAINING – TACTICAL RESPONSE TO SUICIDE BOMBING INCIDENTS (TRSBI), 1.5 HOUR COURSE

The course provides law enforcement officers, tactical operators, and law enforcement supervisors and command staff with the knowledge and skills to implement response strategies for active suicide bombers and post-blast incidents. Participants are presented with information regarding criminal incidents versus terrorist incidents and the mindset and tactics necessary to respond to and mitigate the effects of a suicide bomber. This information is presented using case studies of incidents within the United States and discussions regarding the lessons learned from these incidents.

#### Presenter:

John Stamatopolous spent 28.5 years with the Tucson Police Department, holding positions as a SWAT operator, sergeant, lieutenant, captain and tactical team commander for over 16 years. Mr. Stamatopolous retired at the rank of Captain, as the department's Executive Officer overseeing day-to-day operations. He has been an explosive breacher since 1995 and successfully conducted 643 high risk tactical operations. Mr. Stamatopolous has trained and mentored thousands of law enforcement officers in support of DHS/FEMA and Department of State initiatives. He has provided training across the United States, Asia, Africa, and the Middle East pertaining to QRF tactics, explosive breaching, hostage rescue, vehicle assault, and tactical communication.





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#### **TRAINING – DRONE ASSESSMENT AND RESPONSE TACTICS, 1.5 HOUR COURSE**

The course presents emergency personnel with the methodologies used to detect, identify, track, assess, respond and report Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) activity. Participants are provided information on the current UAS criminal and terrorist threat, and analog and electronic UAS detection techniques.

##### **Presenter:**

Dan Delgado spent 22 years with the FBI, serving as the Unit Chief at FBI Headquarter WMD Directorate, Critical Infrastructure, Emerging Threats and Technologies Unit, responsible for identifying malicious or intentional misuse of advanced or evolving technologies, and directing proactive measures to conduct outreach to prevent/prepare for potential WMD attacks utilizing these new technologies. An experienced helicopter pilot, Mr. Delgado served 15 years in the US Coast Guard (USCG), logging 2000 flight hours, performing law enforcement and search and rescue missions, rescuing over 30 lives at sea.

#### **CASE STUDY – CURRENT TRENDS IN THE MISUSE OF UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS (UAS) TACTICS, 1.5 HOURS**

The course presents emergency personnel with the methodologies used to detect, identify, track, assess, respond and report Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) activity. Participants are provided information on the current UAS criminal and terrorist threat, and analog and electronic UAS detection techniques.

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#### **PRESENTATION - LAW ENFORCEMENT USE OF DRONES**

This 4-hour presentation by the Franklin County Sheriff's Office Drone Team will showcase the evolving role of drones in law enforcement operations, highlighting their diverse applications in enhancing public safety and security. Drones provide critical support in the protection of soft targets and crowded places, offering real-time surveillance and quick deployment in emergencies. By enhancing information and intelligence sharing, drones enable better situational awareness for first responders and decision-makers. We will explore their effectiveness in combating domestic violent extremism and hostage/barricade situations.

Additionally, drones strengthen community preparedness and resilience by supporting disaster response and critical infrastructure protection. The session will also focus on how drones can contribute to election security, helping to monitor polling stations and detect potential threats. Best practices and lessons learned will be shared, emphasizing the integration of drones into counterterrorism efforts, and policy changes affecting first responders.

Further, if allowed by the venue, the presentation will offer practical exercises with indoor drones where attendees will get the opportunity to fly the drones we use. We will also explore using drones to enhance law enforcement effectiveness while ensuring adherence to ethical and legal guidelines. Join us to explore how these innovative technologies are reshaping modern law enforcement.

- The future of drone technology in the US.

#### Presenters:

- Sam Byrd has been with the Sheriff's Office for 28 years. He worked as a Deputy in corrections and patrol before becoming a Cpl. in communications and civil. Sergeant in corrections, community relations, and patrol. He started on the UAS Team in 2016. He has been a Lt. for 3 years working corrections and currently the third shift patrol Lt. and UAS Team Lt.
- John Rautio has been with the Franklin County Sheriff's Office for 28 1/2 years. He started as a Deputy in Corrections and was there 10 years before going to Patrol. After 7 years on Patrol, he went to the Detective Bureau for approximately 7 years. Next, Deputy Rautio went to CID (Community Intervention & Diversion) for 3 years. Currently he is the BWC (Body Worn Camera) Deputy for Support Services. Deputy Rautio has been on the Franklin County Drone Team since 2016.
- Detective John R Harris, with the Franklin County Sheriff's Office, has 22 years of law enforcement experience. Before getting hired at FCSO, he worked for the Utica Police Department, Licking Memorial Police Department, and Obetz Police Department. At FCSO, he has worked in corrections and patrol and is currently in the investigations division. He has been a part of UAS's (Drone) special team, for the past two years.

### **BENCHMARKING: PREPAREDNESS GRANTS MEET UP FOR STATE ADMINISTRATIVE AGENCIES REPRESENTATIVES**

The presentation will actually be a discussion among representatives of the FEMA Preparedness Grants State Administrative Agencies (SAA 's). FEMA hosts a town hall each year at the NHSC to discuss topics and provide information from the federal government perspective related to the FEMA Preparedness Grant Programs. The meeting request that is submitted today would be for representatives from SAA 's to have a discussion among their fellow SAA colleagues in order to meet, discuss best practices, and form a working group that will facilitate further colleague discussion, and assist new colleagues. The basic format is to identify an experienced colleague for each of the FEMA Preparedness Grant Programs as a subject matter expert, which could facilitate discussion, or answer questions for their program of expertise. The request for this session should take place hopefully prior to the FEMA Town Hall so that SAA 's can assist other colleagues with items related to state administration that don 't involve matters related to FEMA. Hopefully this session will allow the FEMA town hall to be more focused on those strictly federal government to SAA related matters.



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## PANEL DISCUSSION - THE POWER OF GOOD DATA: OPERATIONALIZING STAKEHOLDER PREPAREDNESS REVIEW OUTCOMES

In today's complex emergency management landscape, flexible and effective data utilization is key to improving preparedness and response outcomes. This presentation will highlight innovative updates to the Stakeholder Preparedness Review (SPR) tools presented at the 2024 conference in Miami, focusing on how to operationalize data to drive better preparedness outcomes. We will showcase enhancements to the survey tool and dashboards that provide more actionable insights into regional capabilities and gaps.

Participants will see how these innovations have streamlined data entry into the Universal Reporting Tool (URT), ensuring efficient, accurate, and timely information for local, state, and national stakeholders. We will explore community-specific workshops aimed at empowering local jurisdictions to interpret data and enhance targeted preparedness strategies. Additionally, we'll demonstrate how to use Esri mapping tools to create heat maps that visualize core capability strengths and weaknesses across a region, fostering more informed decision-making and resource allocation.

This session is designed for emergency management professionals and entity leaders looking to translate capabilities data into actionable preparedness outcomes, with a focus on increasing regional resilience through informed collaboration and data-driven strategies. Join us as we explore the power of good data in operationalizing stakeholder preparedness outcomes.

- Demonstrate effective data utilization by highlighting how to leverage updated THIRA/SPR tools to direct data-driven preparedness outcomes that strengthen regional capabilities and improve the efficiency of existing resources.

- Demonstrate how to contextualize data - Guide participants in identifying key data trends and gaps to maximize return on investment in addressing critical vulnerabilities.

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## TRAINING – HOMEMADE EXPLOSIVES: AWARENESS, RECOGNITION, AND RESPONSE, 1.5 HOUR COURSE

The course is designed to provide emergency first responders with the knowledge necessary to recognize and respond to incidents involving Homemade Explosives (HME). Emergency first responders are presented with information on the identification of HME explosive precursor chemicals, HME manufacturing indicators, HME exposure indicators, and pre-detonation and post-detonation response actions. Throughout this course, emergency first responders discuss how to implement safe response strategies when recognizing the presence of HME indicators; understanding these response actions is critical to mitigating the hazards associated with HME.
